

# **OBJECT AND MATERIALS CONSERVATION**

## KARIBARI BOARD MAKING

OM1605 10-14 OCTOBER 2016 (4 day course)

A wide choice of primary training is available in this country in aspects of object care. However, there are relatively few opportunities for conservation professionals to find specialist training in traditional skills and enhance their knowledge of materials and techniques. West Dean College has developed a series of short courses aimed at meeting this training need.

This course is designed to introduce the student to the construction, fabrication and use of the *karibari* (Japanese drying board) through the practical experience of making a board.

The four-day programme also covers the use of traditional Japanese materials, tools and techniques, and the properties of Japanese papers.

Working in teams of two participants will make their own boards comprising a wooden lattice core (100  $\times$  60 cms) covered with 8 layers of handmade Japanese  $k\bar{o}zo$  (mulberry) paper, with the top layer coated with a traditional waterproofing agent kaki-shibu.

Instruction in the preparation of gluten-free wheatstarch paste by cooking, sieving, mashing and diluting, and the use of traditional pasting, wetting and smoothing brushes will be essential components of the course; as will the use of Japanese rulers, knives, spatulas and awls.

Participants are requested to bring their own spatulas.

The course fee includes the cost of the drying board and you will be able to take it away with you at the end of the course.

Day 2 Tuesday

Morning Theory and practice of the wooden cores and their assembly.

Paste and paper: making, sieving, mashing, storing and using the gluten-free wheat-starch paste.

Squaring up sheets of handmade Japanese paper with their chain lines

Measure and square the sheets for the first layer

Apply the first layer of paper to the core

Afternoon Prepare and apply second layer to the core

Day 3 Wednesday

Morning Making the rolls of paper for the overlapping third and fourth layers

Applying the third and fourth layers

Afternoon Knives: Construction, care, sharpening and use of the round-bladed knife

Practise knife-cutting. Practise relaxing paper with the wetting brush (mizubake) and wet cutting.

Prepare and apply the fifth layer

Day 4 Thursday

Morning Prepare and apply the sixth layer (air 'cushion').

Lining practice pieces with different consistency of pastes and the use of pitching

sticks.

Afternoon Prepare the seventh layer. Practise linings. Apply the seventh layer

Day 5 Friday

Morning Prepare and apply the eighth and final layer.

Discuss the manufacture of Japanese handmade paper and the difference between Oriental and

Western papermaking moulds

Afternoon Coating with persimmon (kaki) juice or chosen sealing agent.

Practise the use of the kaki juice. Complete and pack boards

Issue of certificates
