WE6494 HAND ENGRAVING ON METAL

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Learn and develop skills in the traditional craft of engraving on metal.

For beginners the aims of this course are to develop a sound basic understanding of the tools, techniques and materials used in hand engraving, on which to progressively build skills and knowledge. For improvers the objective is to develop your skills under the guidance of an experienced tutor to hone those areas which need improving and to add new skills to your repertoire.

Materials and techniques covered include the preparation and manufacture of tools of the craft, marking-out and transferring techniques. You learn to layout and cut lettering and monograms, how to texture by cutting and by punches and about scrollwork, ornamental engraving, heraldic devices, piercing and carving. Also covered are methods of erasure and finishing techniques.

The course includes talks with illustrations, demonstrations and individual tuition, group discussion and review and individually tailored projects.

If you wish to pursue follow-on classes on subsequent dates, a programme of progression can be organised.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practise.

Wayne Parrott, a Fellow of the Institute of Professional Goldsmiths, is an experienced teacher and runs an engraving workshop specialising in heraldic work.
