ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Learn how to research, develop and maintain a significant body of work from an object, in this instance from the archive of Edward James. Both Sarah and Hayley have spent some time with the archive mining the wide breadth of this extensive collection of correspondences, photographs, abandoned architectural plans, objects and drawings and have preselected a number of items from which you will select one of interest as a starting point prior to the start of the course.

On the first evening you will be given a brief introduction to Edward James, to his ideologies and to the archive itself by Research Assistant Sarah Hughes. Hayley Lock will introduce a number of ways to research using objects, giving examples and citing artists that work through either research led or through integrated research practice.

You will be able to view your preselected object individually and in closer detail on the first morning of the course and be given the opportunity to discuss each object with both Hayley and Sarah in closer detail. You will then be given a copy of the item to work from to develop a deepened understanding of the piece itself. Both Hayley and Sarah will help you identify ways to research your object and develop a number of personal outcomes to explore over the duration of the course.

In the first instance you will be working primarily with juxtapositions, fantasies, nature and the relocation of your ideas. You will be looking at colour, working with and around text moving forward to working with the fragmentary, the abandoned and the unrealised. Each stage will interfere with the previous stage and you will explore how artistic output can be pushed through an individualised aesthetic through sketchbook work.

You will then pull out aspects that you identify as successful to develop further into a more personal body of work that will lead towards producing three completed pieces of work. You will learn how to contextualise aspects of your learning. You will be given one to one tutorials over the course to help you identify and push forward your own creative development. The course will be punctuated with events such as films to advance your creative output.

LEVEL: ADVANCED

Creative development. For the more experienced who want to expand skills, develop their own practise and are open to working intensively to achieve their maximum potential.

Is there anything a potential student needs to be able to do to succeed on this course?

To succeed on this course you will need to be interested in opening up the potential of working with foreign objects to develop a series of varied and perhaps unfamiliar outcomes in pursuit of opening up new avenues of thought, ideas and material development.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Hayley Lock has been teaching on FE and HE Fine Art and Design courses for over 10 years including drawing, textiles, contemporary art practice, sculpture, film, visual and contextual studies. She exhibits regularly both nationally and internationally and has a number of works in private collections at home and abroad.
