WE6693 FNAMFILING FOR BEGINNERS

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

The aims of this course are to introduce enamelling skills to beginners and to show how colour, texture and coloured ideas can be translated into enamels.

Starting with a series of basic test pieces on copper, simple techniques are covered. You should then move on to working on small silver or copper items and by the end of the course produce a small simple item of jewellery.

This is a fine enamelling course and we cover the washing and grinding of enamels in preparation for wet packing. This allows much more scope for controlled and detailed work. We also work with fine wires and gold and silver leaf. I will provide a variety of enamel samples which should encourage you to experiment.

Those with no experience of enamelling follow small steps with copper samples. If you have had some experience then you are encouraged to incorporate some of the other techniques into your samples. You are encouraged to bring examples of your own work as a starting point to discuss ideas.

Day I: Test pieces, covering basic skills.

Day 2: Further samples and beginning to work on special ideas.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS

Starting points. For those with little or no experience who want to go back to basics and would like a structured introduction to a subject.
