WE6676 MAKING GLASS BEADS – AN INTRODUCTION

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course offers an introduction to the art of glass bead making. You will receive a good grounding in practice at the torch both in relation to safety and technique and then build on the skills acquired during the course to make increasingly more complex beads.

You will be taught how to control hot glass in order to shape and decorate beads and will have the maximum time possible at the torch to hone your skills.

The teaching sessions are broken into short demonstrations followed by individual practice of each technique on one or two beads. Repetition of the demonstration/practice loop is often necessary, especially in the early part of the course, to ensure that everyone has a good grip of the basics. There will be periodic opportunities for longer individual practice to consolidate skills and pursue personal ideas. The materials used, in addition to glass rod and powder, include silver leaf and aventurine glass.

You will be given information to help you understand the more technical aspects so that your beads are well-made and durable.

During the course you will make between 20/30 beads, which will provide a record of the various shaping and decorative techniques learnt, and the confidence you gain in handling hot glass will enable you to set up a torch at home if you wish.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS

The course is for those with little or no experience of bead making at the torch and would like a structured introduction to the subject. It is also excellent for those who have tried glass beadmaking on a short taster course and wish to learn more, or those who wish to polish up rusty skills!

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Barbara Mason has made lampwork glass beads since 1997, having studied with several American glass bead artists during this time. She sells her work at specialist shows.
