3D6704 SCULPTURAL ANIMAL FORMS IN WILLOW

Tutor: DOMINIC PARRETTE

Dates: 3 DAYS SUNDAY 29 JANUARY – WEDNESDAY I FEBRUARY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

On this course you learn to how to look at drawings and photographs of animals and learn how to translate these into life-sized, three-dimensional animal forms using willow. Suitable animals are: a cockerel/chicken, sheep, fox, deer or pig, but alternatives may be chosen after discussion with the tutor.

You will learn to look at structure, tension and form to express meaning and animation as you construct and weave your animal. Cable ties will be used to construct the 'skeleton', hence there will be no metal formers used. There will be discussion on how to use and manipulate willow – including selecting willow from the varieties available and soaking prior to use.

The tutor will give many demonstrations on the making process and also plenty of individual tuition as work continues. He will also bring full sized examples of each animal – cockerel/chicken, sheep, fox, deer or pig, as a visual guidance.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS/INTERMEDIATE

For those with little or no experience and for those who have taken a related course. Suited to those who would like a structured introduction to a subject, with further building of skills to work towards independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Dominic Parrette is a coppice craftsman, experienced basketmaker and tutor specialising in willow garden structures and frame basketry. He also works with The Truggery, Herstmonceux. He trained in Countryside Recreation and teaches many rural crafts. Much of the willow used in his work and on courses is grown on his willow beds in Sussex.

GENERAL TIMETABLE:

Day I Construction of the skeleton – body, legs and head Day 2 Adding the 'flesh on the bones' i.e. weaving the willow

REQUIRED PREPARATION:

Source or make photographs and drawings of your chosen animal (from the advised list) especially if you want to make a specific breed of one of the farm animals. You may also bring images of other animal if you prefer to make a different species, but this must be discussed and agreed with the tutor as to its suitability to make on the course. If you have any queries, please contact the college.

The tutor will bring many tools for you to share between you. Please do not buy anything especially for the course, but please bring any of the items listed below if you already have them.

MATERIALS FOR YOUR COURSE:

We have a generously stocked craft shop, which opens daily from 8.30am-2pm.

For any materials you need to purchase from the shop, we suggest you do so during the first morning of your course, after having discussed with your tutor.
