2D6781 WILLOW WORK FOR THE GARDEN

Tutor: DOMINIC PARRETTE

Dates: 2 DAYS SUNDAY 5 MARCH – TUESDAY 7 MARCH

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Focussing on plant supports and willow forms that enhance the structure of a garden, you will be introduced to and develop techniques required to make strong willow work for this environment.

You will be able to choose projects from a range of suggested examples that include spiral wigwam, small hurdles, woven trellis, large willow spheres and domed plant supports.

Brown (unpeeled) willow will be used, some of which will be chosen for colour contrasts e.g. purple willow. A variety of simple strong weaves will be taught and techniques to manipulate larger willow rods.

Following group discussion looking at samples of the tutor's work, you will work on individual projects under supervision from the tutor. You are likely to complete the first chosen project during the first day.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS/INTERMEDIATE

For those with little or no experience and for those who have taken a related course. It is suited to those who would like a structured introduction to a subject, with further building of skills to work towards independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Dominic Parrette is a coppice craftsman, basketmaker and tutor specialising in willow garden structures and frame basketry. He also works with The Truggery, Herstmonceux. He trained in Countryside Recreation and teaches many rural crafts. Much of the willow used in his work and on courses is grown on his willow beds in Sussex.
