3D6701 EXPLORING PATTERN IN TEXTILES

Tutor: SARAH CAMPBELL

Dates: 3 DAYS MONDAY 23 JANUARY – THURSDAY 26 JANUARY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Learn to understand and explore pattern on textiles; in this practical course we'll be looking at pattern, what it does and how it is constructed. Most of the examples and instances will be drawn from Sarah's own body of work.

Please bring a small piece of pattern, cloth, or print about which you have strong feelings, and which has meaning to you. A short discussion around this at the start of the course will offer a chance for everyone to think about their personal aims in this course.

Starting with the idea of pattern as rhythm, and with some practical work making gestural and expansive marks on paper we'll begin to loosen up and enjoy being in touch simply with the paint, brushes and paper.

We will look at types of pattern, what pattern does, the part colour plays and start to work on paper with the aim of making more structured marks. We will consider types of repeats, from the simple to the complex, with the aim of beginning to understand how to construct a repeating pattern.

The objective is for each student to build a little collection of work relating to their own investigations.

We will identify the types of pattern that particularly interest us with the idea of exploring these in more depth as we start to work towards more considered patterns.

We will look at references from nature, from textile traditions and possibly from geometric forms. Sarah will also make some compositions from which students can draw inspiration and content; this will be a time for editing colour and content too. She may also give an illustrated talk about her work.

The learning outcomes:

- a better understanding and greater enjoyment of pattern in everyday life
- a capacity to construct patterns and/or decorative compositions, plus
- a collection of paintings and drawings
- a simple understanding of the possibilities of production

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE

Skills development. For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills. The focus is on further developing and building of skills working towards independent practice.

Sarah Campbell was co-founder of the renowned design partnership Collier Campbell. Alongside her continuing commercial design practice, she is a speaker and tutor in design. Her designs appear on textiles, stationery and decorative objects.
