WE6936 SHAKER BOX MAKING

Tutor: MURRAY MARKS

Dates: WEEKEND FRIDAY 28 APRIL – SUNDAY 30 APRIL

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

No previous woodworking experience is needed for this course. You will learn how to make a beautiful set of three nesting Shaker boxes in American red cherry. You will be taken step by step through the box making process, learning traditional Shaker techniques including bending wood in hot water, crafting the iconic Shaker "swallow tail" joint and securing the bands and bases with copper tacks and tiny wooden pins and without using any glue. Along the way there will be time to learn something about the Shakers, their communities and the principles underpinning their designs.

All tools and materials will be provided but please bring an apron. By the end of the course you will know the processes involved in making a Shaker box and be reasonably able to safely use the skills acquired on the course to make a box. An instruction booklet will be provided for you to take home at the end of the course.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Murray has been making Shaker wares since 2003. Having started by teaching himself Murray then went to the USA to develop his skills with John Wilson, a master Shaker box maker. Murray has taught box making in various venues including giving two Master-classes at UCL's Institute of Making.
