LW7007 SHIBORI DYEING FOR TEXTILES

Tutor: JANICE GUNNER

Dates: LONG WEEKEND FRIDAY 26 MAY – MONDAY 29 MAY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

You will be introduced to the fascinating art of stitched, tied, wrapped and clamped resist-dyeing techniques for cotton, linen, rayon and silk fabrics. This traditional method of patterning fabrics has been used widely in many countries, including Japan, India and Africa. Using Procion MX dyes, you will experiment with dyeing and over-dyeing to achieve stunning visual effects on fabric.

The tutor will give informative demonstrations and discussions of the processes for making a variety of Shibori techniques and patterns. Then show how to layer on colour using modern fibre reactive dyes. Preparation of materials and how to make the dye bath will also be covered.

You will build up a good collection of samples showing varying aspects of the techniques. The tutor will also discuss ways of incorporating the samples into quilts, embroidery and textile art and she will introduce ideas for a project, so that you can plan towards this to work on at home (although there will not be time to begin a sewing during the course). The tutor will offer tutorials, question and answer sessions, a group review and an illustrated lecture.

First evening: Introduction and initial preparation by students.

- Day 1: Demonstration of techniques and preparation of materials and dye bath. Stitching and dyeing fabric followed by discussion and tutorials as necessary.
- Day 2: Continued work on projects.
- Day 3: Continued work on projects. A mini exhibition and evaluation of work produced.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Janice Gunner is a stitched textile artist, international teacher and author of *Shibori for Textile Artists*. Her work explores the marks made on cloth using dye, print and stitch in piecing, collage and quilting.

Dyes used initially by the group are included in the course fee (small quantities of additional dye may be purchased from the tutor on an ad hoc basis if used).

Blue water soluble marking pen or watercolour pencil

Cutting mat (these can be borrowed from the college during the course)

A4 layout or sketchpad and a note pad

Pencils, eraser, fine line black pen

Various undyed cotton, calico and silk fabrics

Strong sewing thread for stitched resist

Additional dyes, if needed, and a supply of a variety of Shibori equipment for use during the course

Please bring any of the above, if you have them, and in addition:

Items to tie into your fabric such as small stones or marbles, but not pulses as they swell up and are difficult to remove!

2 metres approx. of assorted cotton, silk, linen or rayon fabrics (pre-washed, without fabric softener and dried) Soft string, rubber bands, pegs etc. anything that you can use as a resist to tie into fabric

Sewing kit

Rotary cutter and cutting mat, if you have one

An apron to protect your clothes from dye

Rubber gloves

A metric measuring jug

Jam jar with lid for mixing dye

Kitchen roll

Sewing kit, needles, thread and scissors etc.
