WE7274 SCULPTURAL WOODCARVING

Tutor: PETER CLOTHIER

Dates: WEEKEND FRIDAY 29 SEPTEMBER – SUNDAY I OCTOBER

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

On this course you will be taught how to design, make templates, choose a suitable timber and select and use the correct tools to create a small wood sculpture (approx. $225 \times 100 \times 30$ mm). This will involve making a sketch model of your ideas (help will be given) in plasticine and from that producing templates which will help with grain alignment and wood selection. The general shape will be produced by band sawing (tutor) and then selection of suitable work holding methods.

The next stage will be carving the shape with chisels followed by final shaping with rifflers etc, with the use of various abrasives giving a sculpted surface. Some sculptures may be left with tool marks if preferred.

Finally we will look at various options for finishing the sculpture such as wax, Danish oil etc.

Guidance as to the suitability and choice of subject will be given and most students should expect to finish a piece of sculpture by the conclusion of the course. Please bring any pictures, drawings or other illustrations of any subject that you would like to make. Resource materials in the form of a very good library and the internet are available for students use.

Complete beginners, as well as those with previous carving experience are very welcome to join the course.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Peter Clothier works as, wood carver and sculptor, having studied sculpture at the City and Guilds of London Art School. His book *Sculpting in Wood*, was published in 2007 and he contributes articles to Woodcarving Magazine.
