S4D07342 WILLOW BASKETMAKING - TRADITIONAL TO CONTEMPORARY

Tutor JOE HOGAN

Dates: 4 DAYS SUNDAY I OCTOBER – THURSDAY 5 OCTOBER

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Laying down a good border is such a fundamental part of basketmaking that Joe would like everyone to begin by making an Irish potato basket or skib. This will also involve making choices about the underneath protective rim and then trying to make a border which has no obvious beginning or ending. Thereafter you can branch out to make different functional baskets or make an artistic style basket. It is not important that everyone follows the same route, since all can gain from the diversity of work made by the group, but it is essential that you contact the tutor (email is joe@joehoganbaskets.com) to give him some idea of what you would like to make. You will be working mainly in natural/brown willow so Joe needs to have some idea to give an indication of what to prepare. He also plans to supply a small amount of variously coloured willows for the skib bases.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practice.

The course is for makers with some experience. It is not necessary to be very experienced but you do need to be familiar with basic weaves such as pairing and waling.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Joe Hogan has worked as a basket maker since 1978. His practice allows him to live rurally and to be involved in the entire process from growing the material to making the finished object. He has become increasing interested in making sculptural or artistic baskets but also continues to make functional baskets and values the fluency that comes from repeated making. He has taught extensively, running courses from his home as well as teaching regularly outside Ireland.

He has written "Basketmaking in Ireland" (2001) which explores the Irish basket tradition and more recently "Bare Branches, Blue Black Sky" (2011), which focuses on his own artistic work. He exhibits widely (see www.joehoganbaskets.com for details) and has also curated exhibitions for the National Craft Gallery of Ireland.

He was selected for the living legends programme at the World Crafts Council summit in Chennai, India in 2012
