SLW07484 AN INTRODUCTION TO PICTURE FRAMING

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course is structured to teach the 'beginner' important basic skills necessary to cut mounts and frame pictures so that they are both enhanced and protected to professional standards.

Basic techniques needed for picture framing are taught and with patience and practice, can soon be perfected. You will be able to frame pictures using the minimum of equipment, which would be possible to achieve at home. It should be possible to frame two/three pictures during the course.

The course covers,— planning and measuring, cutting single and double mounts, choosing colour, determining size/proportions, glass cutting, suitable ways of attaching artwork, cutting and joining mouldings, equipment information, suppliers information; do's and don'ts; routine conservation/preservation, assembly and finish. Demonstrations are given where appropriate alongside one-to-one advice and assistance from the tutor.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS

Starting points. For those with little or no experience who want to go back to basics and would like a structured introduction to a subject.

John Hill is a picture framer and experienced teacher. He has worked as a framer in the UK and Bermuda, and has a keen interest in conservation.

MATERIALS FOR YOUR COURSE:

We have a generously stocked craft shop, which opens daily from 8.30am-2pm.

For any materials you need to purchase from the shop, we suggest you do so during the first morning of your course, after having discussed with your tutor.

Tools and equipment are provided for use by the College and the tutor, but you can bring along any picture framing related items/equipment you may already have.

However, you will need to purchase your framing materials (eg frame, mount card, backing material and glass and various tape) individually as listed below from the college shop.

Available from the Shop:

A limited selection of picture frame mouldings (approx 50 design) and a limited selection of acid free mount board (approx 30 colours)

Hand mount cutters (Logan 2000)

2mm standard picture framing glass

Conservation clear UV glass

Glass cutters

2mm backing board 'Artbak' MDF

Framing accessories

Craft knives and measuring rules

Tapes (acid free, double sided, wide brown, masking tape and decorative)

Art supplies

Please bring any of the above, if you have them, and in addition:

Bring along a small selection of pictures, prints, photographs, watercolours, etc. to frame

Any picture framing related items (including mouldings and mount board) if you have any you feel are useful. Although this is not a necessity as these items are available for sale at the College.
