S3D07646 EXPERIMENTAL LIFE MODELLING IN WAX SCULPTURE

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Use your imagination to mix realities to create characters who did not exist before, and through this process find your own artistic language. On this course, you will be guided through exercises to create forms and sculpture. The imagined characters you create can be transferred to any artistic discipline such as dance, literature, painting, drawing.

Using the human figure as a starting point, you will discover new forms through observation techniques, and be encouraged to perceive your subject in your own unique way. The tutor will explain this concept further referencing slide images of her own work, and artist language, as an example to encourage you to create your own.

The techniques of working with wax will also help you to discover new forms and possibilities. The effects of the temperatures under which work is done, whether cold or hot, will bring you closer to a world of surfaces and textures that will enrich the results of your work.

As a result of this course, you will be in a better position to make art at home, on your own. You will be able to decipher what is inside you, in your imagination, and capture that in an object/sculpture. You will come to realize that one form always brings with it another; it is a never-ending quest that encourages your imagination, creativity and artistic language.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS/INTERMEDIATE

For those with little or no experience and for those who have taken a related course. Suited to those who would like a structured introduction to a subject, with further building of skills to work towards independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Patricia Olguín is a Peruvian/American surrealist sculptor who works in Lima. Born in New York City USA in 1963, Patricia Olguín graduated from the Faculty of Arts of the Pontifical Catholic University of Peru with a mention in sculpture. In 1993 the artist gained MFA Metalsmithing at Kansas University. Her work has been exhibited internationally in both solo and group shows, and is held in numerous collections.

Working with a range of materials (usually a mix of wood and metals), Patricia Olguín creates simple but beautifully complicated pieces in terms of surfaces, finishes and textures. The light bounces off of each element in different forms. www.patriciaolguin.com
