"Letterpress is a traditional printing technique developed by Johannes Gutenberg in Mainz the 1450's in order to duplicate the printed word using lead type. Letterpress today is enjoying resurgence; I believe that letterpress printed text from hot metal type is unrivalled for the crispness of its impression, the quality of its typefaces and for that illusive third dimension that is completely lacking in much of todays' printing. The depth of colour, touch and even smell, allied with an opportunity to think creatively with words and letters that exist in the physical form, provide a timely antidote to todays' digital world."

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

You begin by planning the structure of your book, which will be 8-pages in format. A wide range of metal and wood type will be provided alongside two printing presses; an Albion and a Farley proofing press. Instruction will be given in how to compose lines of type using a setting stick, how to impose those lines into a chase and how to successfully lock that chase up so that it can be transported to the press.

You will then be guided through the various stages of the printing process and learn to apply ink and pressure in harmony so as to create the perfect printed impression. There will be opportunity to bind your book, applying a simple stitch thread to your works.

During the course you will be encouraged to react and think imaginatively when confronted with the constraints of the letterpress process, and to allow the look of the book to evolve rather than adhere to a preconceived picture. This will help open up your creativity and possibilities for experimentation. Ideas on the content of the books will be discussed as a group on the first evening session, and will develop during your time spent with the type cases and presses.

By the end of the course you will have completed 10 copies of your book to take away. You will have gained knowledge and skills in working with type, ink, presses and paper as well as simple binding. You will also have gained confidence in working with letterpress imaginatively.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Patrick runs Nomad Letterpress from the Whittington Press, near Cheltenham. Patrick grew up working at the Press with his father John, studied History of Art at Leeds University, and went on to finish his apprenticeship with Hand & Eye Letterpress and Alan Kitching in London. Patrick is co-editor and printer of Double Dagger, printer of Matrix, 'the finest periodical of the book arts of the 20th Century', and has led letterpress workshops and demonstrations extensively throughout the UK and Europe.
