SWE07657 JEWELLERY FOR COMPLETE BEGINNERS USING SILVER AND OTHER MATERIALS

Tutor: DAPHNE KRINOS

Dates: WEEKEND FRIDAY 23 FEBRUARY – SUNDAY 25 FEBRUARY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course will give you a sound idea of the basics of jewellery making. You will learn and experience what is involved in fabricating a piece of jewellery in practical terms and are encouraged to develop your own designs after the initial practical introduction.

First you produce a simple ring to be finished by lunch time, which shows you important and basic techniques. But, after this is completed, I shall encourage you to each make (finish) one or more pieces of your own design, possibly using some other materials apart from silver.

Materials and techniques covered include sawing, drilling, shaping with pliers sheet as well as wire. You learn how to solder a ring and overlapping metals. Other techniques explored include forging wire and roller printing using various stencils as well as forming simple shapes using doming punches.

According to your need, I shall demonstrate techniques as well as helping each person individually.

Day I: Demonstration of sawing, filing, bending metal using pliers – demonstration of function of

different tools.

Making a simple band ring.

Start on individual design after discussing possibility of construction.

Day 2: Continue on individual pieces. Group display and discussion of what has been achieved.

LEVEL: BEGINNERS

Starting points. For those with little or no experience who want to go back to basics and would like a structured introduction to a subject.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Daphne Krinos trained at Middlesex in the eighties. Since then she has been designing and making her distinctive jewellery which is featured in many publications and exhibitions in the UK and abroad. Her work is in several public collections.
