S5D07579 SIMPLE AUTOMATA

Tutor: ROBERT RACE

Dates: 5 DAYS SUNDAY 21 JANUARY – FRIDAY 26 JANUARY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

In the first session participants look at a few very simple ways of producing movement. This is illustrated by the tutor's collection of moving toys from around the world that exploit the properties of a variety of materials and use a range of simple mechanisms to produce movement. There will also be a chance to see some simple automata, principally in wood, and including the tutor's own work in driftwood and a range of books on automata and moving toys.

Over the five days, students first make a balancing toy, as an introduction to the materials and tools available. They are then encouraged to develop their own design for a simple automaton. The tutor's collection of automata is all available again on the following evenings when students have an opportunity to discuss their progress and plans, if required. The aim is to complete this project around lunchtime on the last day, leaving time for a group review and discussion of possible developments and improvements.

Students work with wood, plus a range of additional materials such as wire, string, plastic, etc. There is an emphasis on reclaimed and recycled materials, including driftwood, although this will be provided, students are welcome to bring their own contributions of interesting materials. The woodworking skills needed are pretty basic, but include the use of a fretsaw/scroll saw and a bench/pillar drill.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Robert Race, an established maker of automata and simple wooden toys, is an active member of the British Toymakers Guild. He exhibits his work widely.
