S4D07662 PAINTING STILL LIFE - TOWARDS ABSTRACTION

Tutor: NICK BODIMEADE

Dates: 4 DAYS SUNDAY 25 FEBRUARY – THURSDAY I MARCH

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course is about going beyond representation to develop personal expression, responding directly to still life using mixed media to explore line, form, colour and texture. Through a series of exercises you will get to 'know' the objects and develop the confidence to strip away the superfluous and capture the essence. The aim is to produce a number of studies, culminating in a finished painting, or group of paintings, displaying your own expressive interpretation of the subject. Acrylics are preferred due to their fast drying qualities, but if you wish to use oils you must use Zest or another low odour thinner (not turpentine).

Each day will start with a slide show of relevant contemporary and historical artists and end with a review of the days' activities.

We will construct a still life and through exercises explore the objects, their qualities and spatial relationships, plus the negative spaces they create. You will be expected and encouraged to take risks, make unplanned studies, try new methods of making marks, plus different media and to generally free up. You begin with studies in line as an analytical tool and a medium of expression. You will then explore form using collage to force a simplification of shapes. To create an exciting environment you will be asked to display your work — there will be discussions and evaluation at key points.

Delving into physical textures you will discover the dynamic they can create within the picture plane. Next you explore the expressive and evocative qualities of colour.

Using the studies made you then begin to abstract from the subject by editing, simplifying, cutting up, drawing from, etc, which will start to form the basis for a finished painting.

When you start painting directly onto canvas or board, you will work mainly from your studies, and/or from memory, and only using the actual still life for casual reference if at all. The tutor will give you individual support throughout with evaluation and discussion at key points as you complete your painting(s).

The tutor will help you consolidate and resolve your paintings on the morning of the last day, allowing you to complete any final touches. The course finishes with a group appraisal and feedback.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Nick trained at Worthing and Wolverhampton art colleges, has taught at many UK schools, colleges and universities at all levels up to MA. He exhibits with St Annes Galleries, Lewes, Zimmer Stewart Gallery, Arundel and the Porthminster Gallery, St Ives. Nick's work is held in many public and private collections including The Contemporary Art Society, The Landmark Trust and the Government Art Collection. He is a Trustee of Fabrica, Brighton's leading Contemporary Art Gallery.
