S5D07501 BORDER – PARALLEL WORLDS: CONCEPTUAL JEWELLERY

Dates: 5 DAYS SUNDAY 3 DECEMBER – FRIDAY 8 DECEMBER

JAPANESE WEEK

This course takes place during the Japanese Week and is one of a group of courses focusing on inspiration from Japanese Art both traditional and contemporary with a mix of tutors who are either native to Japan or whose working practise is influenced by Japanese aesthetics. As part of this week additional talks will feature by tutors and visiting artists, giving insight into their creative practice and teaching. Studio visits to the other courses will also be encouraged.

You could also choose to arrive early on Sunday December 3 to watch or participate in (£10 charge) a traditional tea ceremony held at 3pm and 4.30pm in the Old Library (see www.westdean.org.uk /events for further information and to book).

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Explore how to express the concept of borders and a parallel world through art jewellery. You will be introduced to the Japanese conceptual knot Musubi, and the spatial concept of Ma and negative space. Inventiveness and engagement with the natural world will be encouraged. There will also be technical demonstrations on knotting and wax modelling with talks and group and individual discussions.

BORDER /PARALLEL WORLD:

Where does a 'Parallel World' exist? Can one discover this world through time travel? Is it perhaps possible to see this world in a dream? Or does it only exist in one's heart?

The world we see is only a part of the entire reality which is composed of many worlds existing simultaneously, side by side. We can find 'Parallel Worlds' whenever we open our eyes and hearts. They are always with us.

DAY I: BORDER

Quick assignments to get to know each other.

Lecture on 'Parallel Worlds'.

Introduction of Japanese knot techniques.

DAY 2: MAKING BORDER

Introduce concept of MA (space+time). Thinking and feeling – discussion of concepts.

DAY 3: BREAKING BORDER

Field work – looking for the parallel world from nature.

Sketching with natural materials.

DAY 4: BREAKING BORDER

Working with wax models.

DAY 5: BREAKING BORDER

Final developments.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practice.

Mari Ishikawa obtained a master degree of art at Nara University of Education and subsequently studied jewellery making at the Hiko Mizuno College of Jewellery in Japan. In 1994 she went to study at the Academy of Fine Arts in Munich under Otto Künzli. In 1999 she became Masterstudent, graduating in 2001. She has received numerous awards for her work and it can be found in many public collections including the Victoria & Albert Museum, London and the Museum of Art & Design, New York.
