SWE07600 TEXTILE BASKETRY - BEAN PODS, WEAVING POCKETS AND OPENINGS

Tutor: MARY CRABB

Dates: WEEKEND FRIDAY 2 FEBRUARY – SUNDAY 4 FEBRUARY

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Intended as an extension to either the beginners/intermediate pod forms course, or for those students who already have some skills in stake and strand or twined basketry, this course will focus on the weaving of small three-dimensional bean and pea pod forms.

The course will concentrate on the technique of twining, making a connection with both basketry and textiles. Twining requires the weaving of an active element around a passive warp. The weaving is worked in the hands with the use of a few simple tools. Basics of joining in new threads, changing colours and adding warps will be briefly revisited.

There will be an emphasis on weaving pockets and openings. This will be taught by changing the direction of the weave to create slits – considering the edge of the slit and how to finish it, and also by the addition of warp threads to create protruding pockets.

Working through a series of exercises to learn the techniques on the first full day of the course, you will then have the opportunity to experiment with materials, scale and designs on the second day.

Mary will demonstrate techniques, provide visual notes and offer individual support to enable you to create your own decorative woven bean and pea pod forms.

By the end of the course you should be confident with the process of making pockets and openings, using twining to create a selection of three-dimensional samples and be able to adapt the technique to work with a range of materials.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Originally learning traditional willow basketry techniques Mary attended a textile basketry course at West Dean College, which led her to develop her own style of contemporary basketry. Working with fine flexible materials using adapted basketry techniques Mary is intrigued by the connections between basketry and textiles. In 2009 she won an international award for Artistic and Designer Basketry, is a Yeoman member of The Worshipful Company of Basketmakers and a member of The Basketmakers' Association.
