S5D07724 FURNITURE MAKING FOR BEGINNERS – A SIDE TABLE

Tutor: TOM KEALY

Dates: 5 DAYS SUNDAY 18 MARCH – FRIDAY 23 MARCH

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course is designed for those with little or no experience of fine woodworking or cabinet making, who would like to explore working with hardwood timber and to acquire the skills which could lead on to making your own furniture designs. During this course, through demonstrations and practical work, you will make a small side table – a project designed to take you step by step, through all the various processes necessary to produce a table.

The primary focus is on working with traditional cabinetmakers hand tools, to a high degree of proficiency and accuracy, which are sustainable in a non-commercial or home workshop.

Some of the topics discussed include understanding the wood grain and how to make the best use of it, the use of a hand plane, the setting out and cutting of mortise and tenons and oil finishing.

At each stage the tools required, and how they should be used, will be covered. You will learn the basic principles behind sharpening and maintaining the tools used. If you want to buy your own tools in the future, the course is also an ideal opportunity to learn about the various factors to consider when purchasing tools.

Tools will be provided by the college, however if you have your own tools do bring these with you.

Teaching will be by way of tutor led demonstrations and practical work,
