

OBJECT AND MATERIALS CONSERVATION

CARE OF SCULPTURE IN GALLERIES AND COLLECTIONS

M3D07326 26 FEBRUARY-I MARCH 2018 (3 day course)

A wide choice of primary training is available in this country in aspects of object care. However, there are relatively few opportunities for conservation professionals to find specialist training in traditional skills and enhance their knowledge of materials and techniques. West Dean College has developed a series of short courses aimed at meeting this training need.

This course will provide a broad ranging background to the subject for both traditional sculpture and modern and contemporary 3D artworks. It will cover a range of sculptural provide materials and will relevant information about fabrication and surface finishes where it might specifically affect the delegates in the course of their work. The course will discuss how sculptures may degrade or become damaged and propose preventive care measures for display in the indoor and outdoor settings. We will also look at suitable storage and packing for different materials as well as condition checking for exhibitions and collections. There will be a visit to the Cass Sculpture Foundation at Goodwood.

Course Leader:

Lyndsey Morgan is an accredited conservator with more than 25 years of experience working in museums and galleries. She specialises in sculpture and spent II years working at Tate working with a range of

diverse materials and a busy exhibition schedule that culminated in her role as lead conservator for the Tate Modern installation. After leaving Tate she formed her own private practice, Patina Art Collection Care Limited, 11 years ago. She now works on a wide range of sculpture projects for galleries, private and commercial clients worldwide. She has a first degree in archaeological conservation and an MPhil in the Artificial Patination of Bronze Sculpture.

Course tutor: Tessa Jackson is an accredited conservator with 28 years of experience working on the conservation of sculpture and objects in the commercial, gallery and private sector. She gained a BA Hons in ceramics becoming an apprentice prior to conservation the 1980s, followed by chemical training and a two-year internship at Tate. This provided expertise in varied materials, now used in her private practice which was established 22 years ago. She specialises in modern and contemporary sculpture with the diverse materials, finishes and requirements they present. Her client list consists of the major galleries and national collections, auction houses and private owners in the UK and abroad.

Participants will be custodians of sculpture in exhibitions and collections, eg exhibition organisers, art consultants, curators and conservators from other specialisms.
