S3D07514 CONVERSATIONS BETWEEN LINO BLOCKS – ADVANCED

PRINTMAKING

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course is aimed at those students who wish to challenge themselves both technically and creatively. In working with a number of lino blocks to create a single image, you will be shown how many surprises and new horizons are possible in the multitude of options available by overprinting and combining this with the reduction linocut process.

You will be shown the correct way to use printing inks, presses and cutting into blocks. You will also be shown how to print without a press and experiment with the effects that caustic soda can have on a block. Perhaps more importantly, you will be encouraged to take risks with this process and embrace the chance element that this activity can bring. In so doing, you will become braver with your image making and more competent at making your general creative practice more successful.

You should expect to make a lot of work during the course; the tutor aims to conduct the days in an atmosphere of fearless excitement peppered with fun and confidence.
