S3D07865 BOTANICAL PAINTING - FLOWERS AND BUGS

### ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

In a true Natural History style, you will add garden bugs to botanical plant portraits. The beautiful summer gardens at West Dean will provide plants for you to paint from life, while the insects will be painted from photographs (or ipad/computer screens if you have your own), allowing for useful enlargements.

You will learn different painting techniques adapted to different subjects, such as wet-in-wet for flowers and foliage and dry brush techniques for small insects. You will develop your skills and confidence, as well as gain knowledge of natural forms.

In this course you will:

- Improve skills in wet-in-wet watercolour techniques.
- Learn about colour-mixing and how to keep watercolour painting clean and glowing.
- Gain knowledge of insect morphology and plant anatomy.
- Develop your observation skills.
- Combine botanical art with natural history.

You will look at how to compose a picture including diverse subjects from different sources and how to paint realistic depictions of plants and insects while retaining a creative approach and technique.

The course will contain a combination of demonstrations, short lectures and one-to-one advice. Beginners will be able to follow step-by-step demonstrations while more advanced students can choose their own subjects and pace.

By the end of the course you can expect to have completed one large painting or several smaller pieces of work.

# LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practice.

Sandrine Maugy is a renowned botanical artist and author who has been teaching at West Dean for almost 15 years. She regularly writes for *Artists & Illustrators magazine* and her first book *'Colours of Nature'* was published in 2013.

Green-bias yellow: Daniel Smith Hansa Yellow Light, or Daler-Rowney/Schmincke Lemon Yellow (not

Winsor & Newton)

Orange-bias yellow: New Gamboge or Indian Yellow

Orange-bias red: Scarlet or Vermilion

Violet-bias red: Permanent Alizarin Crimson or Permanent Carmine, or Daniel Smith Anthraquinoid Red or Schmincke Ruby Red

Pink: Permanent Rose (not Opera Rose)
Violet-bias Blue: French Ultramarine

**Green-bias Blue:** Phthalo Blue Green Shade or Winsor Blue Green Shade

White: Titanium White

Other useful colours: Quinacridone Red or Quinacridone Coral, Magenta, Perylene Violet, Burnt Sienna,

Burnt Umber, Raw Umber

# Available from the Shop continued:

A wide selection of **brushes** (synthetics preferable to sables)

Watercolour paper: Hot Pressed or Cold Pressed, at least 300gms if in a block (glued on 4 sides) or if you stretch your paper; or 640gms if in loose sheets

# Available from the tutor:

Some specific paints, brushes and heavy paper (640 gms) will be available to purchase from the tutor during your course.

# Please bring any of the above, if you have them, and in addition:

Cotton cloth (to wipe watercolour brushes)
