

## SHORT COURSE DETAILS

S3D08117 TRADITIONAL UPHOLSTERY FOR BEGINNERS

Tutor: RICHARD RICARDO

Dates: 3 DAYS MONDAY 16 APRIL – THURSDAY 19 APRIL

#### ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course covers the basic methods of traditional upholstery working on small chairs or stools with a drop-in seat, or pin-stuffed seat and without springs (see illustrations overleaf).

The tutor's demonstration on the first morning will show how to tackle upholstering the drop in seat of a stool. He will then offer guidance with each step of the process while working on your own chair. This includes:

Webbing How to measure, stretch and fix webbing using the web stretcher, tacks and hammer.

Stuffing Types of Hessian used; the amount of stuffing materials needed and the use of twine;

attention to fullness and shape before final tacking down with the calico cover.

Your seat will be covered with calico and finished with fabric. If time allows, you may be able to begin a second seat. At the end of the day, the tutor will discuss the different types of fabric and needlework suitable for loose seats.

If you are considering attending the tutor's five-day 'further techniques' course in the future, you could bring your intended project (either a stuff-over chair or stool are appropriate) to discuss any necessary pre-course preparation, but on the beginners' course it is only possible to work on small drop-in or pin stuffed seats.

#### **LEVEL: BEGINNERS**

Starting points. For those with little or no experience who want to go back to basics and would like a structured introduction to a subject.

## REQUIRED PREPARATION:

## Please bring one or two of the following:

A chair/stool with loose drop-in or pin-stuffed seat, one large or two small; **or** a corner chair or small stool, provided there are no springs (please see illustrations overleaf). **It is essential to bring the whole chair.** You should make sure that the frame of the piece you wish to upholster is not broken, as only minor repairs can be undertaken during the course such as re-gluing joints. Please note that chairs with upholstery over the edges of the seat cannot be attempted on this course – but are suitable for the five-day course.

Bare wood foot-stool frames (approximately 12"  $\times$  15"  $\times$  10") can be purchased from the College Shop (approximate cost £20) if you have nothing suitable on which to work. If you require one, <u>please</u> complete and return the attached slip, at least four weeks before the course.

Also Bring: A dust sheet or old bed-cover; an apron; a large pair of SHARP scissors; tape measure; notebook; pencil; top cover upholstery material; any of the following tools if possessed (magnetic or pin hammer, pincers, pliers, tack lifter, ripping chisel).

#### MATERIALS FOR YOUR COURSE:

We have a generously stocked craft shop, which opens daily from 8.30am –2pm.

For any materials you need to purchase from the shop, we suggest you do so during the first morning of your course, after having discussed with your tutor.

Many materials (other than top cover upholstery fabric) can be purchased from the tutor and the College Shop. Upholstery tools are provided by the College for students' use.

#### You will find it useful to bring:

A dust sheet or old bedcover

An apron

A large pair of SHARP scissors

Tape measure

Notebook and pencil

Top cover upholstery material (the tutor will also have a selection for purchase)

An old leather glove to protect your hand when stitching

Tools if possessed (magnetic or pin hammer, pincers, pliers, tack lifter, ripping chisel – all clearly marked with your name)

#### **HEALTH AND SAFETY:**

The tutor instructs students in health and safety issues relevant to this course. Students may work unsupervised on agreed projects once they have satisfied the tutor as to their competence. There may be restrictions on the equipment available to students in the tutor's absence. All Personal Protection Equipment, apart from footwear, is provided by the College.




