

## SUMMER SCHOOL SHORT COURSE DETAILS

SSS08043 THROWING FUNCTIONAL TRADITIONAL AND

CONTEMPORARY FORMS - POTTERY

### ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Within the inspirational environment of West Dean, you will choose to make traditional or contemporary work, exploring form and function. The course combines the opportunity to develop throwing skills, apply decorative techniques at all stages, along with glazing and firing.

The satisfaction of completing a handled mug or jug, a set of plates, a lidded casserole, along with its component parts, or creating non-functional work with detailed attention to form, fully justifies the challenge of the process.

In the ceramic world, vessels for food, storage and cooking go back at least 4,000 years. Right up to the present day they have been, and still are, a vital part of home life. Food and drink always tastes better and looks more inviting from a handmade pot while the character and feel of a non-functional pot, contemporary or traditional, is tangible compared to an industrially produced one. We will be discussing these ideas within the frame work of the Summer School.

The course starts with an introductory talk taking a look at historical and contemporary examples. The next step is to check out clay preparation techniques together, get the wheels ready for action followed by a throwing demonstration by the tutor.

Whilst the group start practising on the wheel, the tutor will look at your ideas on a one to one basis, and discuss which forms to work on, according to your level of experience. Earthenware, stoneware and porcelain clays will be available.

On the following days we concentrate on throwing, turning, and getting the most out of the clay. This includes making the component parts needed i.e. handles, lids, lugs, knobs, and more decorative additions. The tutor will demonstrate all techniques.

The drying of work ready for biscuit firing will start to take place from the end of Sunday onwards, with the glazing and decorating where applicable, following on.

On the last two days, we concentrate on the completion of any outstanding pots. On Friday the final firings will be unpacked.

For those with any outstanding work, these can be biscuit fired and collected at a later date or can be glazed for you. You can also return to the college to glaze you own work on a glazing day: see notes on page 3.

The course is restricted to eight students with each having the use of a wheel for the whole course. You are taught at your own individual level, encouraged to practise, and are introduced to new ideas and methods of making, where appropriate. Where possible please bring your working ideas, sketches or photos of the forms you wish to make.

#### I FVFI: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practise. Students need to be able to centre their clay.

#### ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Alison Sandeman is a senior tutor at West Dean. She makes thrown functional and individual pieces in stoneware, porcelain and Raku, at her well established pottery studio on a farm, near Chichester, where she also enjoys maintaining a core range of domestic stoneware. She has worked with University College London on a research project about ancient making techniques, and is currently involved with the wood fired kiln at the Cass Sculpture Foundation.

PLEASE BRING A STAMPED, SELF-ADDRESSED POSTCARD WITH YOU (or a card with your name and email address) if you wish to leave your work at the College for glazing and firing, so that we can let you know when your pieces are ready for collection.

Please note that your work will be kept for collection for six months from the postmark date on your returned postcard (or the date of the email).

Firing and glazing of completed pieces: Students normally have three options at the end of the course.

- 1. Students may leave any raw, finished pieces that they wish to keep, for biscuit firing, basic glazing and re-firing by the College, for collection at a later date.
- 2. Students may leave raw, finished pieces for biscuit firing at the College. They may then book a place on a Glazing Day the details and fee are advertised in the short course programme and learn how to glaze their work themselves. This work will be re-fired and available for collection at a later date. (There is no additional cover charge for practical glazing days.)
- 3. Students are free to take away their unfired pots for glazing and firing elsewhere.

#### **HEALTH AND SAFETY:**

The tutor instructs students in health and safety issues relevant to this course. Students may work unsupervised on agreed projects once they have satisfied the tutor as to their competence. There may be restrictions on the equipment available to students in the tutor's absence. All Personal Protection Equipment, apart from footwear, is provided by the College.

### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE VISUAL ART & CRAFT SUMMER SCHOOL

Attending an intensive Summer School course allows you to experience a range of creative activities alongside your course. Special Summer School features:

- Inspirational talks by tutors and displays of their work.
- A swap-over session to another course of your choice.
- An optional evening at the Chichester Festival Theatre (pre-booked at a group rate, via a form we send you in May).
- A free afternoon on Wednesday to explore Chichester or other cultural highlights on offer in the locality.

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- A special party with dinner, entertainment and music.
- Workshop displays of students' work and informal end-of-course group reviews.
