

### SUMMER SCHOOL SHORT COURSE DETAILS

SSS08063 CERAMIC SURFACES – EXPLORING CONNECTIONS WITH

DRAWING AND PRINTING

### ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course introduces a ceramic technique developed by the tutor for making fine drawings in clay using slips. You will explore how drawing and printing on paper can be integrated into working and making with clay, with a focus on the exploration of this process as much as final outcomes.

The ceramic technique will be introduced at the outset and then revisited in much greater depth. It involves using pigmented slips on a smooth plaster surface by making incised, engraved and painted marks, motifs and images. These 'drawings' are then transferred to a semi porcelain clay body through the process of slip casting. The resulting work can have an extraordinary amount of fine linear detail, not usually associated with hand drawn ceramic decoration.

The technique and process has strong associations with printmaking and would be of interest to anyone interested in exploring mark making, not only in ceramics, but in a range or media – textiles, jewellery, surface pattern, 2D design and in drawing and mark making more broadly. You will make 2D and relief ceramic works suitable for tiles, wall pieces, elements for inclusion into mosaics and jewellery. Work can be fired at the college.

Prior to working with clay, you will explore drawing and mark making on a variety of papers, and will investigate some low-tech printmaking techniques including mono printing and relief printing. This will help to clarify the nature of the *reverse image*, which is a feature of the ceramic technique, and will give you a more exploratory approach to your drawing and mark making in ceramics. Mark making, design, composition, the placement and arrangement of elements on a 2D surface, line, colour, texture, subject, visual narrative and context will all be considered and discussed during the creative process.

At the end of the course you will have experienced and learnt about a range of drawing and printing techniques for making work on paper which will help to inform the work you make in ceramics. You will have learnt about, and practiced, a specific technique in ceramics for making drawings and designs that are embedded into the surface of the clay. You can expect to produce a collection of exploratory drawings and prints, test pieces and tiles by the end of the week.

The course will be very structured at the beginning and teaching will be through a series of demonstrations and exercises. As the course progresses you will have a greater opportunity for undertaking more individual projects with constant tutor support.

#### LEVEL: BEGINNERS/INTERMEDIATE

For those with little or no experience and for those who have taken a related course. Suited to those who would like a structured introduction to a subject, with further building of skills to work towards independent practice.

### **ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:**

Joanna trained in printed textiles followed by a ceramics MA from the RCA. Over the past 30 years, her work has involved making work to commission and for exhibitions, projects in education and part-time lecturing. Surfaces, 2D design, drawing, printing and making ceramics, are her primary preoccupations within her own practice and her teaching.
