S5D08143 BOOKBINDING FOR ALL

Tutor: JOHN ROBINSON

Dates: 5 DAYS SUNDAY 16 SEPTEMBER – FRIDAY 21 SEPTEMBER

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

This course aims to teach the basic principles of bookbinding. You will begin by making a simple hand-bound book from scratch to gain an understanding of key techniques. You then move on to continue to make new books, and/or rebind or repair books you have brought with you.

If you are a beginner, your first project is to make a book, starting with the folding of white paper into sections, sewing, end papering, gluing-up, rounding and backing, and case-making. Once made, this book can be used to take course notes. Equipped with working knowledge of the basics of bookbinding, you can then start work on your own book projects, which can include making new books, or small repairs to pages, or boards of books you have brought with you to the course.

Those with some experience may also make repairs and renovation of cloth/leather bound books, although it is advisable not work on valuable or heavily tooled books.

The following skills may be covered during the course, as applicable to individual books brought:

- folding of paper into sections;
- sewing on tapes;
- end-papering;
- gluing-up;
- trimming;
- rounding and backing;
- headbands;
- case making;
- repair of pages/boards;
- repair or renovation of cloth/leather bindings;
- gold foil lettering technique.

All techniques required will be demonstrated and talked through stage by stage. Much of the tuition will be on a one-to-one basis, as applicable to student's individual projects.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practise.

John Robinson is a self-employed bookbinder and a winner of the Society of Bookbinders' competition for a restored or conserved binding.

Suitable projects can include breaking down of a loose book block and resewing; reattaching loose plates; and mending broken spines.
