S3D07934 REVEALING THE NARRATIVE IN WOOD - SCULPTURAL CARVING

Tutor: WYCLIFFE STUTCHBURY

Dates: 3 DAYS TUESDAY 12 JUNE – FRIDAY 15 JUNE

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

The aim of this course is to get to the essence of timber's beauty.

Following the first evening session's discussion, we will spend the following morning walking a designated woodland area of the West Dean estate seeking out a branch or root of a tree which has a characteristic that has appeal. This may be found on the forest floor or possibly cut from a tree. We will then return to the workshop and go about enhancing, focussing in on that element which appealed to the maker. Through carving, cutting and surface treatment we will learn to open up and reveal the narrative behind the timber. It may be a scar, a split, an area of rot or a disfigurement that needs to be exposed.

The teaching will centre partly around technique, but it will also concentrate on keeping the maker's intervention to a minimum. We should see ourselves as editors of the natural world. We are removing an element from nature, coaxing out or exaggerating a feature and allowing it to be viewed out of context. Through different texture treatments, shaping and material removal we reveal the story behind the tree.

The sense of place is important. This will be about taking material from a particular place, and the work should be rooted in that location. This course is not about displaying technique but about stepping aside and allowing the timber to speak for itself.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Wycliffe trained at the London College of Furniture and worked as a cabinet maker for many years in his own business and within other businesses in Sussex, London and Ireland. In that time he was awarded the Worshipful Company of Furniture Makers gold award for a bespoke gun cabinet, worked as a prototype and pattern maker for prominent designers and a model maker for industry. He went back to university and emerged at the end having decided to enter the commercial art world but nurturing his love of timber.

As a tutor at Bartlett School of Architecture, students approach him with ideas and he guides them in techniques and materials and encourages them to realise the ideas in an achievable way. His practice is low tech and he is keen for his work not to be admired for its technical ability but for the way it has revealed what was already there.
