SWE08590: CREATIVE DRAWING - MEANINGS AND MARKS

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Discover how to develop themes and meanings in your drawings that add to the aesthetic of your work, and explore your subject matter in more depth.

You will learn how to put narratives, abstract images, insert signs and symbols in to your drawings, and to create multi-layered meanings within the work. By working with the subject and new processes, you will be able to begin work more easily and get past the tricky problem of starting a piece.

Drawing exercises will encourage you to think more laterally about image making, and about what you want to communicate through drawing, and find innovative ways of drawing. Exercises themselves can also be part of the drawing process to help you explore themes.

The house and gardens will be used within the course alongside a still-life setup in the room. You will be supported with group critiques and individual tutorials.

On completing the course you will have increased confidence in drawing, will be able to communicate deeper messages and meanings within your work, and be able to choose the correct materials and colours for the messages you want to put across in your pieces.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practise.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Freya Pocklington trained at Edinburgh College of Art (BA) and UAL (MA) in Drawing and Painting. Her work is held in the V&A, British Museum and Royal Scottish Academy collections. She is represented by Breese Little Gallery in London.

A range of brushes (one for small detail and a few larger ones for washes)

Fixative
