SLW08319: WILLOW BASKETRY - USING SCALLOMS

Tutor: MARY BUTCHER

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

A scallom is a long tongue made by cutting each willow rod in a particular way so that it can be attached to a hoop or basket base in an efficient, elegant way. You will first learn, with uncut material, how scalloms work. This will be followed by learning the cutting method to prepare the rods, a knack which may take some practice. You will then make at least one structure using them, a platter for hot baking just out of the oven, a small shopper or an appropriate object or basket of your choice.

During the course you will gain a good knowledge of this method for constructing traditional English baskets, using a variety of weaves for base, sides and borders. It can be used for elegant trays for cooling bread, cakes or for serving cheese, with or without handles. You will also hear about some appropriate basket history, willow growing, harvesting, preparation and use.

LEVEL: INTERMEDIATE/ADVANCED

For those who have taken a related course or have some existing skills, and for more experienced practitioners who want to expand skills. The focus is on working towards independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Mary Butcher MBE is a basketmaker, exhibition curator, writer and teacher. She held a prestigious crafts residency at the V&A's Sackler Centre in 2009. She received an MBE for services to basketmaking in 2012 and one of two Crafts Skills Champions Awards in 2013. Recent exhibitions include 'Basketry Making Human Nature' at the Sainsbury Centre for Visual Arts in Norwich 2012, Re-Making the Past from the Devon Guild of Craftsmen and tour, 2014 (a study in Bronze Age Creativity), and 'Dimensions' in Denmark from May 2016.

Please bring as many of the following as you have available (but no need to purchase anything especially before you come):

Tape measure

Ruler – at least I ft long

Old bath towel/piece of old blanket at least 5 ft long (essential)

Notebook and pencil

2–3 spring clothes pegs

Small hammer or rapping iron

Pair of sharp secateurs (preferably 'parrot-beak' shape)

A good pen knife

Side or wire cutters

Basketmaker's bodkin (at least 5")* – can be borrowed from the tutor

Masking tape*

A spray bottle for water

It is also useful to have an apron (not supplied) and essential to wear sturdy covered footwear in the workshop
