S3D08291 EXPRESSIVE PAINTING WITH ACRYLICS

ABOUT YOUR COURSE:

Investigate and experiment with colour, tone and texture using acrylic paints and mediums to develop your own unique visual expression. Use a variety of tools, painting surfaces and approaches to encourage a freedom and spontaneity in mark making.

You will learn to playfully experiment with materials which will increase the elements of chance and the incidental in your painting. Through this intuitive process you will allow the form and composition of your subject to be teased out as you add and remove paint, using techniques of thin washes and thick impasto. You will work both from memory and from inspirational images or objects as you allow your subject to emerge. The tutor will offer one-to-one support and guidance towards finding your own process and expression. You will explore what brings a painting to life, considering contrast, focal points and perspective.

By the end of the course you will have gained confidence in your use of colours, marks and textures to create exciting and dynamic paintings. You will have gained insight into the processes and materials that inspire a freedom of expression and un-bounded mark making in your work, taking home a number of experimental painted studies and/or completed paintings.

LEVEL: SUITABLE FOR ALL

A subject focused course that is delivered to suit any level of experience from beginner to advanced practitioner. A structured start is followed by guided independent practice.

ABOUT YOUR TUTOR:

Maggie Feeny has been a teacher and professional artist for over 30 years. She trained in Bristol, London and Brighton and has taught painting and ceramics. She curated exhibitions in her Artist's Open House, Brighton, attracting artists from London, Cornwall and neighbouring counties. Maggie's work is exhibited nationally in both private and public spaces.

Acrylic Wood Primer, Acrylic Flow Medium, Acrylic Liquitex Modelling Paste, 3 x MDF 6ml Boards 30 x 30cm, Decorators low-tack masking tape, Small rubber kidney.

Available from the shop:

Acrylic paints, <u>suggested colours</u>: Titanium White, Black, Burnt Umber, Burnt Sienna, Prussian Blue, Cyan/Cerulean Blue, Yellow Orchre, Lemon Yellow, Cadmium Orange, Crimson or Magenta, Red of choice and any others you particularly like

 $2 \times 30 \times 30$ cm min canvas (more if desired)

Acrylic paper pad A2 or A3 (Seawhites is good quality)

Flat brushes (not decorators as too thick) Seawhites Baker Brushes are great for texture, buy a variety of sizes from 10 to 50

2 Palette knives

Small sketch book and basic drawing materials

Please bring any of the above, if you have them, and in addition:

Containers/receptacles with lids, these can be jam jars, yoghurt pots etc for mixing and storing runny paint, 3-4 would be useful

Large flat palette (could be plastic table mat or rubber tile)

Small water spray bottle

Suitable clothing for working with acrylic paint
